In his study, Krashen (1982) observed that audio resources improve the process of learning a natural language. He highlights

Krashen's hypothesis states that for language acquisition to happen organically, children need to come across content that is just a little bit above their comprehension level (i+1). As a result, audiobooks and other audio resources assist students in establishing authentic speech environments.

Eventually, CDs and MP3 audio resources were added to the language learning process. With the advent of the internet and cell phones in the twenty-first century, audiobooks, podcasts, and mobile language learning apps (like Rosetta Stone, Pimsleur, and Duolingo) have proliferated. Numerous audio and video-based language learning tools are presently being used in Uzbekistan. The "Ibrat Farzandlari" platform, for instance, gives language learners the chance to acquire the foreign language of their choice. In addition, Vandergrift and Goh's research indicates that learning a language through audio resources greatly enhances listening comprehension abilities. According to their research, pupils who consistently listened to audio materials developed their hearing skills and enhanced their accents. Additionally, this research examined the impact of metacognitive methods on the listening comprehension process and discovered that students might further enhance their performance by honing their listening tactics. Listening to audiobooks on services like Audible, Google Audiobooks, LingQ, and others has grown in popularity and is now a crucial component of multimedia language training strategies. Which approach to language learning works best? Many language learners are interested in this question. Audiobooks have emerged as a popular tool in addition to traditional literature. Learning a language through audiobooks improves one's capacity to hear and comprehend it in natural settings. When learning a language, audiobooks offer numerous benefits. It improves kids' listening comprehension abilities, for instance. Students learn the meaning of words and phrases in a real-world setting by listening to actual speech. According to other research, listening to audio content daily enhances a listener's comprehension and rapid listening abilities. Additionally, listening to people with various accents improves listening comprehension and gets one ready for conversation in everyday situations. For instance, consistent listening to podcasts and audiobooks enhanced the listening comprehension abilities of English language learners by 30%, per research by Renandya & Farrell. Moreover, audiobooks' capacity to expand vocabulary is another advantageous feature. Understanding the meaning of new words and phrases is made easier by hearing them in their natural context. The process of learning new words based on context is also sped up since audio resources make it easier to comprehend how words are used in authentic speech environments. For instance, research by Brown (2007) shows that learning words through context is more effective than acquiring them through standard translation. One group of students learned new terms based on context during the research, while the other group solely

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learned vocabulary through translation. According to the findings, students who studied using context were able to retain words for extended periods and effectively use them in everyday conversations. Additionally, audiobooks enhance communication skills by allowing listeners to better comprehend the grammatical constructions, phrases, and pronunciation of the language they are studying. Pronunciations and speech patterns acquired through audio resources can also be applied more quickly and efficiently in everyday situations. As a result, the learner of the language can communicate more effectively and fluently. At the moment, audiobooks play a huge part in language acquisition.
